
Bishop Rice celebrates Ash Wednesday Mass with SCHS students

In the Gospel of Luke, chapter 24 we read the story about two of Jesus' disciples on their way to Emmaus after Jesus' crucifixion. They are lamenting His death and the loss of their hope that Jesus was the one to bring about the redemption of Israel. As they walked

Jesus joined them, but they did not recognize Him. He asked what they were discussing as they walked and they replied, "Are you the only one visiting Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?" "About Jesus of Nazareth," "He was a prophet, powerful in word and deed before God and all the people. The chief priests and our rulers handed him over to be sentenced to death, and they crucified him; but we had hoped that he was the one who was going to redeem Israel." (Luke 24:20-22)

As evening came on Jesus acted as if he was to continue his journey but the disciples beckoned Him to stay with them for the night. As they sat down to eat Jesus blessed the bread and broke it. This was an action they had witnessed on countless occasions. Thus, it was at that moment they recognized Jesus! And...then Jesus vanished from their sight.

As you may know, our curriculum here at Springfield Catholic High School is reliant on service, not only hours required for graduation, but students who provide the most service to their community are recognized at graduation. A good starting point for our students in terms of service hours, is our clubs. Almost every club hosts service opportunities or raises donations. For example, most clubs have uniform buyouts as a means to raise money. The money usually goes to benefit the club as a whole or is donated to a charity. Many clubs have drives. For example, Rotary managed a food drive and HOSA managed a children's book and toy drive. Additionally, the NHS coat drive provided an estimated 200 coats and mittens to Isabel's House and St.Joseph.

One of the most important service opportunities for our Tri-M, as well as our choir and Irish Singers members, is the Heart Full of Love event, which happens annually near Valentine's Day. The event features student performances and a tea and dessert bar. According to the event's organizer, Maggie Lowrance, the event raised \$746, which will go to the music department. "I'm super happy about how it turned

out," said Lowrance. "I'm very proud of everyone who performed."

The Art Honor Society took it a step further by painting portraits of African refugee children, which will be shipped transcontinentally to the respective children. Eventually, members of the Art Honor Society will be sent videos of the children receiving their portraits. Furthermore, the Art Honor Society will have a second service project in the spring, which will involve sending art to retirees.

The greatest amount of service opportunities arise from our house system. At the beginning of the new year, a penny war was set up among the four houses, in which all proceeds were donated to Ozarks Food Harvest. The house system has also worked with local organizations such as the Glendale Nursing Home, which involved making cookies, chocolate covered strawberries, Valentine cards, and various Valentine trinkets; Isabel's house and the Ronald McDonald House, in which they made bags for kids with snacks, notes and toys; and the Pregnancy Care Center, where they provided 3 car loads of diapers and other various baby items.



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
Please know that all of you are in my prayers of gratitude for your support to Springfield Catholic Schools. Your generosity of time, talent, and treasure is outstanding. As you probably know, the Development Board has been working hard on our continuous school-system wide fundraising efforts: The Fund for SCS (the Annual Fund), Soiree, and Emerald Evening. Our newest project is The Shepherds' Fund endowment supporting teacher and staff salaries and benefits.

In our last Irish Connections, we let you know that The Shepherds' Fund is already supporting our teachers and staff salaries with an additional 0.5% raise in the 2021-2022 school year making that year's total raise 4% for every staff member. The faculty and staff at SCS have dedicated themselves, through their vocation, to helping our students receive a Catholic education and grow in their faith. In recent years, we have experienced increasing difficulty in retaining and recruiting teachers and staff for two main reasons: because our compensation packages range from between 17 and 22 percent



We must be very careful how we address this risk. Aggressively raising tuition to meet this need would decrease enrollment and revenue substantially, and our mission continues to be making Catholic education accessible to all. We know that a conservatively managed endowment is the best way to ensure the high quality of our Catholic education by providing a perpetual revenue stream to supplement the revenue required to pay our teachers and staff what they deserve and what they are worth.
