in the Gospel of Luke, chapter 24 we read the story about two of Jesus' disciples on their way to Emmaus after Jesus' crucifixion. They are lamenting His death and the loss of their hope that Jesus was the one to bring about the redemption of Israel. As they walked Jesus joined them, but they did not recognize Him. He asked what they were discussing as they walked and they replied, "Are you the only one visiting Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?" "About Jesus of Nazareth," .... "He was a prophet, powerful in word and deed before God and all the people. The chief priests and our rulers anded him over to be sentenced to death, and they crucified him; but we had hoped that he was the one who was going to redeem Israel." (Luke 24:20-22)

And in this current raise making the total raise $8 \%$ for each staff. We are already making progress but we have a long way to go to make sure we ontinue to have the best staff for our children

The faculty and staff at SCS have dedicated themselves, through their vocation, to helping our students receive a Catholic education and grow in their faith. In recent years, we have experienced increasing difficulty in retaining and recruiting teachers and staff for two main reasons: because our compensation packages range from between 17 and 22 percent

below those of the Springfield Public Schools, and the choice of education as a profession has been has accelerated since the pandemic

We must be very careful how we address this risk. Aggressivel raising tuition to meet this need would decrease enrollment and revenue substantially, and our mission continues to be making Catholic education accessible to all. We know that a conservatively managed endowment is the best way to ensure the high quality of our Catholic education by providing a perpetual revenue stream to supplement the revenue required to pay our teachers and staff what they deserve and what they are worth.
